Smoke Free Battle Lights Up Columbus

On June 28, Columbus joined 1,700 cities across the United States in passing a clean air ordinance, banning smoking in all public areas. Just before casting the final "yes" in a five to one vote, City Council President Matt Habash said, "The reality is that this is a health hazard."

Those for and against the ban feel passionately about the issues involved. In fact, the legislation has been bitterly debated since it was presented to City Council at the beginning of June. Council members have received over 3,000 emails, faxes, phone calls and voice mails in just three weeks and over 150 people testified in two highly contentious public hearings.

Those opposed to the smoking ban are concerned about the impact of the legislation on small businesses, especially restaurants, bars and bowling alleys. Many of these businesses rely on their smoking customers and fear that a smoking ban in Columbus will chase those dollars to the suburbs and townships that allow them to

He asked council members to table the legislation, allowing time to form a task force to give both sides an "opportunity to strike a balance." Central Ohio Restaurant Association President and restaurant owner, Thom Coffman, told City Council members, "I truly believe it's going to hurt us.'

Attorney and small business owner, **Bradley Frick**, called the smoking ban a

"cutting-edge health issue" and urged Council members to "do something that has a positive effect on the health, safety and welfare of our citizens." Citing the well-known dangers of second hand smoke, Dr. Rob Crane sees clean air legislation as inevitable. "Not a matter of if, but when," he said. "And when, as a doctor, is a question of how many? How many lives will be lost before we take action?"

The battle isn't over, however. Voters may very well see this issue on the ballot in November. And both sides are looking to the state legislature to see if they decide to take action on the issue.
