The Ohio Patriot Act Senator Jeff Jacobson, Ohio Senate; Carrie

Introduced in late January by state Sen. Jeff Jacobson (R-Butler Township), the Ohio Patriot Act, or Senate Bill 9, sailed through the Ohio Senate with unanimous support. The anti-terrorism bill, which would expand police powers and strengthen anti-terrorism laws, now heads to the Ohio House. The version of the bill passed by the Senate has generally been praised by lawmakers and some opponents as a more clearly written document that now musters bilateral support. However, the bill still has critics. Civil libertarian groups, such as the ACLU of Ohio, have concerns that the bill unnecessarily expands police powers, threatening individual rights. 

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
