Congressman Ted Strickland

In May 2005, Congressman Ted Strickland announced that he's seeking to become governor of Ohio and said he will enter the office "ready to pour his heart and soul into fighting for the dignity of families and all people in Ohio."

Born on August 4, 1941 in Lucasville, Ohio, Strickland is the son of a steelworker, and one of nine children. He has served as a minister, a psychologist, and a college professor. Strickland served as the director of a Methodist chil-

dren's home, an assistant professor of psychology at Shawnee State University, and a consulting psychologist at the Southern Ohio Correctional Facility.

During his last five terms in Congress, Ted has served on the House Energy and Commerce Committee and is also an active member of the Congressional Steel Caucus. Last term, Congressman Strickland became a member of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs.

Blending the Old and New

Across the country there is a renewed interest in our communities' historic resources. While it's one thing to save an old building and convert it to another use, it can be quite another to combine it with new construction. This blending of the old and the new has been an ongoing struggle for neighborhood associations, historic purists, elected officials and developers alike.

One argument is that historic districts need uniformity, scale and conformity to preserve historic

character. They need to encourage architectural sameness, not innovation and imagination. On the other end of the spectrum, there are those who argue that historic integrity can be achieved without simply copying existing buildings. They insist that preservation and innovation are indeed compatible.


Our panel will discuss this dilemma from both a historic and practical perspective, incorporating

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
