International Columbus: Port of Call on the Silk Road

Subtle giants come and go in our community with little recognition from most of us. While they attract little attention, they are vital to our economy and our lifestyle. Hundreds and hundreds of freight trains bring goods to our warehouses.

Trains and logistics are a critical employment and economic industry sector for Central Ohio. In the same way that the Silk Road provided points of connection for traders from East to West in ancient times, modern trade routes connect the world and Columbus. Central Ohio's central location provides optimum warehousing and distribution capabilities to provide efficient service throughout the interior of most of North America. Historically, ports of call along major trade routes became hubs of industry, commerce, and culture. By expanding trade routes that connect Columbus to the global logistics map, central Ohio will benefit as a modern age port of call.

Our 21st century silk road -- the Heartland Corridor -- is a public-private partnership between the Norfolk Southern Railway (NS), the Federal Highway Administration and three US states to improve railroad freight operations. The \$150 million plan is facilitating more efficient travel on NS rail lines between the Norfolk, Virginia port region and two Midwest destinations-Chicago, Illinois and Columbus, Ohio.

Part of the Rickenbacker Inland Port, the Columbus Foreign-Trade Zone #38 offers the opportunity to bring foreign goods into the US by rail, truck or air without Customs regulations before shipment into the U.S. stream of commerce. These special trade free zones decrease barriers to entry of foreign goods entering the U.S. by saving time, money and paperwork.

Another key piece to this road is the expansion of the Panama Canal which will double its capacity by 2014 by allowing more and larger ships to transit. The expansion will create demand along the US Eastern Seaboard for ports able to handle post-Panamax ships as of January, 2012. Though ports from Miami to New York are considering renovations including dredging, blasting, and bridge-raising, only Norfolk, Virginia is completely ready for these larger ships.

At CMC on March 28 will feature logistical experts from a seaport and airport. Jeff Keever, senior deputy


