From Service to Civilian: **Challenges for Returning Veterans and Citizen Soldiers**

Today's service members have different experiences than those of past generations. Many survive combat, but may have long-term physical and mental recovery issues that require specialized healthcare. Many are "citizen soldiers" who hold civilians jobs or attend college, as well as serve as military reservists. The complexities involved in balancing those worlds are similar to the challenges of moving from a full-time military to civilian life.

While it's typical for uniformed military personnel to receive handshakes or applause of gratitude from fellow Americans, this is just a small gesture to show gratitude to our military. What's really needed is for the greater community to help ease transition in key areas such as employment, education, healthcare and housing. The overall behavior of a community is instrumental in helping or hindering service members' return to civilian life.

According to Lt. Col. Kathryn Lowery, Director of Community Outreach for the Ohio National Guard, "the response of the Ohio public is heartwarming - consistently positive and warm." Her military assignment is to build capacity in support of service members and their families. Doing so maximizes readiness and wellness of our military forces to secure the federal mission abroad, at home in and in our own community.

Offering help as a good neighbor is also valuable to service member families whether it is babysitting, cutting the lawn or simply sharing a meal. Lowery explains that the Ohio National Guard is still operational (still deploying) and that by keeping the Guard and their families healthy, and prepared, we are, in a sense promoting our own security. "No action is too small."

Support from employers is important for veterans entering a new career and those returning. Employers should be knowledgeable about USERRA, the law that oversee the re-employment rights of service members. To encourage the retention and recruitment of service members, the Ohio National Guard hosts the employers' advisory council.
