Franklinton is the next CMC forum topic





"There's a tenacity to Franklinton, determination that the neighborhood can be better" says Jim Sweeney, director of Franklinton Development Corporation. The CMC forum on Jan. 27, The Real Franklinton, will offer insight to the evolving neighborhood just on the other side of the Scioto River from downtown Columbus.

Panelists will be Dana Vallangeon, CEO of Lower Lights Christian Health Center, Nick Stanich, director of Franklinton Gardens, and Trent Smith, executive director of the Franklinton Board of Trade.

Franklinton, founded in 1797, was the site of the original community along the west side of the Scioto River, prior to the decision to make Columbus the state capital. Historic floods in 1913 and 1959, garnered the neighborhood the moniker "The Bottoms" because of the flood plain and also because it was an economically depressed area. The neighborhood deteriorated for almost 50 years until a plan was put in place to rebuild a flood wall that would protect the property owners and offer affordable flood insurance rates.

With assistance from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and federal funds, shoring up a flood wall was the first step in the neighborhood improvement plan which was completed in 2003. This was not a quick fix; violent crime was still a common occurrence. Some mark the the turning point of the neighborhood as 2011 when the Riverside-Bradley public housing complex was demolished.

There are plans for new housing developments offering walking distance to downtown including high-rises, townhouses and some rehab projects creating apartments. The goal of Franklinton leaders is also to raise the economic opportunities for current residents, yet challenges of poverty

Sweeney explained that "rebranding of the neighborhood as a creative, innovative center helped." Property values are slowly rising and new residents and businesses are moving to Franklinton. The Franklinton Development Corporation is focused on improving housing options by building new and rehabbing old homes for both sale and rent. They welcome new residents but also want current residents to remain.

Several new businesses such as Land Grant Brewing and Franklinton Cycleworks are thriving and other businesses have moved to the area such as the Columbus Idea Foundry and Glass Axis. The Franklinton Arts District has encouraged other creative businesses and artists to move to the neighborhood.
