Ohio ALICE Report — study of financial hardship

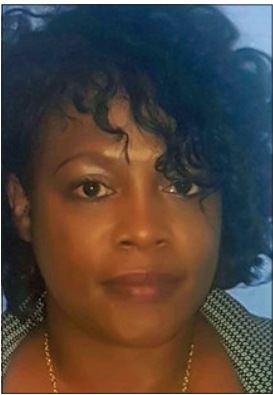
Cashiers, child care workers, food service personnel, librarians, bank tellers, health care aides, repair technicians, landscapers and auto mechanics — people we cross paths with on a daily basis, may be struggling to make ends meet.

The next CMC forum will focus on the Ohio United Way ALICE Report which shows data about hard working but economically challenged Ohioans.

Featuring speakers are Steven Hollon, President & CEO, United Way of Ohio, James Hardy, Deputy Mayor and Chief of Staff, City of Akron and Jo’el Thomas-Jones, Director of Energy Assistance Programs, Community Action Partnership of Greater Dayton.

The forum will be moderated by Jo Ingles, journalist, Statehouse News Bureau.

ALICE was born in 2009 at the United Way of Northern New Jersey coined the anacronym from Asset Lim-

ited, Income Constrained, Employed, which refers to individuals and families who are working, but are unable to afford the basic necessities of housing, food, child care, health care and transportation.

United Way agencies in multiple states are adopting this new definition of poverty, instead of the federal poverty level. ALICE workers are essential to the labor force and the future success of our communities is directly related to the financial stability of ALICE households.

Through the report, United Ways in Ohio plan

to inform and encourage a dialogue among those who can help change perceptions and the future circumstances for ALICE families.

The agencies understand that there is no quick fix and each community will have different issues to address. Both short-term and long-term solutions will be considered.

“Presenting such an important report at the Columbus Metropolitan Club enhances the impact of the ALICE campaign launch, provides statewide exposure to the project and begins the conversations that need to

occur if we are to assist the ALICE population.

The opportunity to introduce ALICE to a wide range of community leaders at the CMC is invaluable and we thank their many members and supporters,” said Steve C. Hollon, president and CEO, Ohio United Way.
